

Immigration Detention and Community Statistics Summary

31 October 2013



About this report

This report provides an overview of the number of people in immigration detention and offshore processing centres as at midnight on the date of the report. The report is produced on a monthly basis.

Data is sourced from several departmental processing and recording systems. Data relating to the immigration detention population is dynamic and there can be delays in transmission of information from the department's immigration detention network operations. Variations in figures between this report and previous issues can occur. Due to these issues, data from the current financial year should always be considered provisional.

Note: Bridging Visa figures in this report only relate to illegal maritime arrivals.

Immigration Detention and Community Statistics Summary

As at: 31 October 2013

There were 6401 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention, including 4072 in immigration detention on the mainland and 2329 in immigration detention on Christmas Island as at 31 October 2013.

Separately, 3290 people are living in the community after being approved for a residence determination and 22 873 are living in the community after grant of a Bridging Visa E.

Community Population by State/Territory

Of the 3290 people approved for a residence determination to live in the community, 41% are situated in Victoria, 19% in Queensland, 18% in New South Wales, 9% in South Australia, 9% in Western Australia, and 2% in Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory.



Immigration Detention Population from 1990 to 31 October 2013

The number of people in immigration detention month to month continues to fluctuate, predominantly due to the changing pattern of illegal maritime arrivals. The number of illegal maritime arrivals in October 2013 were down by 60% compared to the previous month.

Figure 1 - Population in Immigration Detention




People in Immigration Detention by Arrival Type

The number of people in immigration detention, who arrived unlawfully by air or boat as at 31 October 2013 was 9251. This represents about 95% of the total immigration detention population.

There were also 440 people (about 5% of the total immigration population) who arrived in Australia lawfully and were subsequently taken into immigration detention for either overstaying or breaching their visa conditions, resulting in visa cancellations.

People in Immigration Detention by Nationality

Of the 6401 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention as at 31 October 2013 around 28% were Iranian nationals, 16% were Sri Lankan nationals, 10% were Vietnamese nationals, 7% were Afghan nationals and 6% were Pakistani nationals.

Of the 3290 people living in the community after being approved for a residence determination, as at 31 October 2013 around 27% were Iranian nationals, 24% were Sri Lankan nationals, 17% were Afghan nationals and 7% were Iraqi nationals.



Children in Immigration Detention

As at 31 October 2013 there were 1045 children (aged under 18 years) in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention.

The number of children in immigration detention facilities reduced in October as children completed mandatory processing and were transferred into the community or to an Offshore Processing Centre as part of a family group.

The number of children living in the community after being approved for a residence determination has been maintained at a high level with an increase in October 2013 to 1770 children.

Figure 4 - Children in the Community under a Residence Determination



Time in Held Immigration Detention


Of the 6401 people in immigration detention facilities and alternative places of detention as at 31 October 2013 around 38% had been detained for 3 months or less and 95% had been detained for 12 months or less.

The average period of time for people held in immigration detention facilities has significantly decreased from 277 days in November 2011 to 139 days as at 31 October 2013.

Time in Community Detention

Of the 3290 people in Community Detention as at 31 October 2013, <1% had been detained for 3 months or less and 45% had been detained for 12 months or less. This includes the period detained in facilities and/or alternative places of detention prior transferring to community detention.

The time in detention is cumulative and includes periods in detention facilities and community detention.
